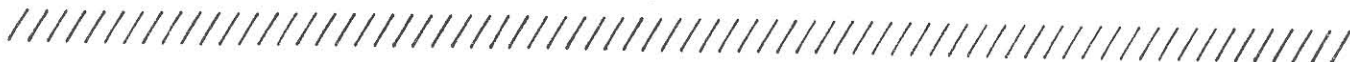

And married they were, she walking by his side until death divided them.

To this affectionate union were born six girls and two boys, namely Louise Murphy Tallavast, Daisy Murphy Tabor, Nellie Murphy Painter, Martha Lee Murphy Gaar, Josephine Murphy Johnson, Holly Murphy Carnwell, Augustus Benjamin Murphy and Samuel Jackson Murphy. A great deal could be said for the children of Garrett and Frances (Pierce) Murphy, but only that of Samuel Jackson Murphy will I make mention. His life dedicated to the service of others, and won for him the valued position of Judge of Manatee County, Fla., a seat he held for twelve years. He was Justice of the Peace for nine years, Traffic Officer and State Land Inspector for four years in the same county. He had just been elected to a new four year term when he died, Dec. 24, 1948. The last election, Samuel Jackson Murphy got more votes than any single candidate had ever gotten in that county for any office. He was loved and respected by everyone except his political enemies. It was said of him, that he jailed so many motorists, including his friends, for drunken driving, that the place of detention became known as "The Murphy Hotel". Samuel Jackson Murphy did not take the examination which would have qualified him for admittance to the bar, but in all his time on the bench, he was never reversed by the Supreme Court of Florida but once.
