

2. Enoch Edward Crews, born January 23, 1872; died February 4, 1955; buried at Crewsville cemetery; married Isabelle Bethea, daughter of Dougall Carmichael Bethea and Sophie Whidden.
3. George Lafayette Crews, born December 23, 1873; died December 31, 1945; married Madie Jackson in 1896.
4. Walter Charles Crews, born December 27, 1875; died July 24, 1902, buried at Crewsville cemetery.
5. John B. Crews, born December 22, 1877; died 1948, buried at New Hope cemetery; married in 1897, Ola Boyd daughter of John Boyd and Nancy J. Bethea.
6. Reuben J. Crews, born December 6, 1879; died February 9, 1968; married _____ Overstreet.
7. Dempsey Dubois Crews III, born January 30, 1882; died October 3, 1940; married Marian Peelman.
8. Martha V. Crews, twin born May 21, 1884; died March 23, 1907; married David Albritton.
9. Mary L. Crews, twin born May 21, 1884; died October 31, 1954; married James L. Bowen.
10. Harvey K. Crews, born December 18, 1886; married Lucille Moore.
11. Austin Crews, born November 14, 1888; died May 26, 1900, buried at Crewsville cemetery.
12. Francis "Frank" Crews, born May 8, 1890; died October 19, 1959; married 1st, Ida Tucker; married 2nd, Juanita Moore.

The Crews family was listed in Precincts 12 & 11 in the 1880 census of Manatee County. Some of their neighbors were Samuel E. Collins, Charles B. Collins, Asa Hogans, Willis Crews and Mary Hunter. Their neighbors in the 1885 Manatee County census were D. S. Lanier, William Hare, C. L. Crews and John Collier.

On August 5, 1890 Dempsey D. Crews, Jr., age 44, resident of Crewsville, DeSoto County applied for an invalid pension. He received this until his death.

Francis I. (Collins) Crews died on August 12, 1890 and was buried in the Crewsville cemetery. Her grave is the oldest marked one in that cemetery.

On September 7, 1892, Dempsey married Martha Jane E. Lanier at Zolfo Springs. She was born February 24, 1871. Their children:

Dempsey D. Crews, Jr. died June 10, 1895 after being shot by John Lucas outside a store at Crewsville. W. B. Collier described the incident in an article in The Miami Herald written by Nixon Smiley entitled "Bloodshed on the Big 90":
