WILLIAM HENRY HART AND THE HART CEMETERY

The following history was compiled and written by Vera Crews Bush in collaboration with Blanche Crews Scott, granddaughters of William Henry and Mary Hart. It was contributed by Mrs. Claud S. Hart of Frostproof and Mr. Charles Hart of Okeechobee, and is continued from Issue #25/26.

While Mark was overseas their baby was born prematurely and died. It was the first member of the fourth generation to be buried in the family cemetery. The young wife waited alone for the return of her husband.

The year 1918 the war was still raging in Europe; American boys were leaving by boatloads for oversea duty, and by train loads for training camps, here at home. In early fall an epidemic of Spanish Influenza struck the camps here in America, as well as the civilian population. Doctors were not familiar with the treatment of the disease so many became seriously ill, and died because they did not know how to take care of themselves after they were stricken.

As the flu raged in America the German military realized they were fighting a senseless and futile war so Kaiser Wilhelm was forced to abdicate his throne and the military powers of Germany signed an Armistice with the Allied powers. In the eleventh hour, of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918 the Armistice was signed and the peoples of all the involved countries went wild with joy in the knowledge that the war had come to an end. This was "the war to end all wars".
