George T. CASON, youngest son of Dennis Marion CASON, traveled to Madison with his father's blessing. He later continued his travel to Parowan, Utah, where he began his contracting and carpenters work. He became known as one of the finest finished carpenters in southern Utah. George T. George married Sarah Astella (ROWLEY) CASON and had five children: Mary CASON TAFT, Ruby CASON ILIFF, Georgia CASON BENSON, Lucile CASON JOHNSON & Paul Rowley CASON.
